



## BRENDAN Najjib



#### How long have you been creating/promoting events?

First party in 1998, first Halloween party in 2001, first festival after party in 2002. First No Way Back party in 2007.

## How old were you when you promoted your first event and what was it? How did it go?

Our first major event was for the From Beyond series with Dean Major from Syst3m. We did the Valentines Saturday of 1998 at Saint Andrews Hall, also incorporating the Burns room which was decorated by Amber of Infinite Dimensions. 2,000 people attended. I was in mimic twenties. We also did a special invite only party the night before at Seventh City to celebrate the fact that we made it this far with the records with our friends and international guests. We had flown over Patrick Pulsinger and Erdem Tunakan who ran Vienna's Cheap label, the Hague's I-f, who did impromptu vocoder vocals over their live set, Phoenicia / Soul Oddity / Schematic from Miami and many others. It would all come full circle when Dean Major worked the door at the inaugural No Way Back, like I did sometimes for Syst3m in the past.

#### Why do you do it? What motivates you?

If you don't like what's happening, why wait for someone else to change it? If you would like to see something different, something that would inspire you, why not create it yourself? I wanted to go to an event where you felt inspired, like you were part of something special or secret, where the sound, the music, the feeling, the transformation of the space all just hit you - and you could lose yourself.

We started doing events as a reaction to the how things were going in the

city. We wanted people who hadn't directly experienced what excited us so much to be able to feel that spark. With that spark, this music can keep growing and evolving, but without that, this all fades away and all we are left with is the monoliths and historical grave markers. We want to see this continue to grow and inspire, we want people to have that place to express their personal freedom. To truly be themselves. To create a safe place for that is our top goal.

This all grew organically out of a desire to share this vision with the world. In a way promoters are fantasy facilitators, offering an alternate reality where music is valued and a top priority. Events and parties are the art of communicating the raw essence of the music in a visceral sense. It is without thought when it hits you. The greatest goal is that the music could remove you from the endless and impatient march of time, so you could feel eternity again. To transcend time. In that rare moment everything can change for you. You should leave the party physically exhausted but mentally refreshed and energetic.

## Do you think people understand the risk involved in event creation/promotion?

Not at all, but on the other hand, we have so many friends and family that want to help set up for the party that I know people really value these parties.

## What is the most important lesson you learned from choosing this path and how has it helped you in your everyday life?

Schedule time to let yourself recharge after a major excursion. Doing nothing is sometimes the most healthy and productive thing that you can

do. When you return to focus on your creative outlets, it will be much more clear.

#### What projects are you working on now?

We have just launched the Acid Series, a series of records inspired by No Way Back, celebrating its 10th Anniversary. The Acid Series includes submissions from Tin Man & Ectomorph, Jasen Loveland, Justin Cudmore, BMG & Derek Plaslaiko, Jordan Zawideh, Dona, and Romans. They all arrive in a unique sleeve especially created for this series, inspired by the decorations of NWB.

Ectomorph will have an album this fall.

I've been expanding my efforts to get some of our perspective on this music and its history to the world. The following few projects will help communicate that idea.

We're doing live radio from Detroit on Red Bull Radio daily leading up to the festival, and doing every other Tuesday year round. This outlet has been really fun and we've been having great guests. In the past few months we've done shows with John Elliot, Eris Drew, Adult., Rick Wilhite and Beau Wanzer among others.

I have also just finished putting together Funkadelic - Remixed and Reimagined (by Detroiters) for Westbound and Ace Records, featuring a diverse selection of remixers from today's generation looking back at Funkadelic's legacy and recontextualizing it for now. Remixers range from UR, Moodyman, Andrés, Amp Fiddler, Marcellus Pittman, Shake, the

Dirtbombs and Ectomorph among many other heavyweights. It will be a boxset, some 12"es and CDs and digital sometime this fall.

I also just wrote the liner notes to Function's forthcoming Recompiled series on A-Ton, Ostgut / Berghain's archival label. It has been really fascinating doing direct biography work of a fellow prismatic artist.

#### What is your favorite post event place to eat?

Directly after the event - Duly's, where Erika likes to order off menu. The day after - El Barazon or Vince's. I wish Ima was open after the party.

#### How long have you been creating/promoting events?

I started promoting events as a senior in high school. I gave my first event in the early 80s!

## How old were you when you promoted your first event and what was it? How did it go?

I promoted my own event "Hot Stock" back in 1982 - the turnout was ok but as usual, I wanted it to be standing room only! Todd Johnson encouraged me to start that social club. He created the name & logo... it was SWEEEEET Iol...

#### Why do you do it? What motivates you?

I promote events because of the love of the music period! The music is my motivation! The joy I see on the faces of the people who attend and have an awesome experience is priceless to me, but the music and my passion for the music is my driving force!

## Do you think people understand the risk involved in event creation/promotion?

I believe some people understand but most individuals don't have a clue about all of the work, time, money, blood, sweat & tears that's involved in event creation and promotion! They are only interested in the end result - a great event and a great time!

## What is the most important lesson you learned from choosing this path and how has it helped you in your everyday life?

The most important lesson I have learned is to be kind to everyone! When you are involved in event creation & promotions, you never know who

may be the person that will be able to assist you in having a successful event.

#### What projects are you working on now?

I have two promotions that are near and dear to my heart. I am one of the festival producers of Charivari Detroit Music Festival. This event takes place the first weekend of August. This year it will be August 4th, 5th & 6th. You can visit our website at charivaridetroit.com for more information. The second promotion is my Birthday Day DJ Series (B Day DJ Series) which I host/promote under Theresa Hill Events or Theresa Hill/Project 81 Events.

I created the DJ B Day Series to celebrate the DJs who bless us with great music vibes all year long. Quite a few of my friends are international superstar DJs/producers. They give and sacrifice so much of their personal time with their own family & friends that I feel on their birthday, we should celebrate them! I've had the honor of giving the DJ B Day events for Delano Smith, Moodymann, Bruce Bailey and others. Each promotion is tailored to fit each DJ. None of the DJ B Day events are the same. I've known these guys for so long. #### How long have you been creating/promoting events?

 $22\ \text{years.}$  I started helping people and doing more than just attending the party at about the age of 20

## How old were you when you promoted your first event and what was it? How did it go?

I was 25 years old. It was a Halloween party at the Majestic called Delicious Vinyl. DJ Bone headlined, Jeremy Nida played and I dressed up as Aeon Flux. It went awesome! At the time I was bartending at the Majestic Complex and as much as I was a rocker, I was also so into underground electronic music in Detroit. I convinced them they needed turntables in the Magic Stick. If they wanted to stay with what was going on in Detroit they needed to be open to having DJ nights at their famous rocker bar.

#### Why do you do it? What motivates you?

I love it! I love dancing all day and night. I also early on realized that sometimes things were a little off... lights too bright, sound too off, time slots all wrong. So I just figured why not do it myself? I was also lucky to bartend or hang in some cool places that were open to trying things. A lot of my people were making music, having labels, and so forth. I also was so captivated by the people I knew throwing parties and the distinct happy feeling I would have when entering or leaving a party done right, where everyone was just vibing together.

Also I always wanted to keep Detroit relevant as a place for artists to play since it is like the Mecca for electronic music / techno. I wanted to give people the

platform to come from far and wide and play and get to see Detroit.

## Do you think people understand the risk involved in event creation/promotion?

Hmm... Maybe. But there are risks on many different levels / like I never went big and threw super expensive events / nor did I ever throw events in illegal venues (I was a mom when I started a u x e t i c and Girls Gone Vinyl.) However by bringing in international talent - my reputation - Detroit's reputation as a city that knew how to throw a proper party was always on the line, you know?

## What is the most important lesson you learned from choosing this path and how has it helped you in your everyday life?

That if you love something you can be a part of making it happen. You can provide spaces and places for someone's art and someone else's appreciation of it / god this is what I really love about it / putting those two things together.

#### What projects are you working on now?

I'm about to start releasing Girls Gone Vinyl episodically with more than 100 interviews from women all over the world in this business! I'm working with Andrea Superdre Wallace to continue growing her career. I also think a SunDayBeats may be in order this summer. You never know!

## What is the most important lesson you learned from choosing this path and how has it helped you in your everyday life?


I've learned that you definitely have to give it all your all, be dedicated and passionate. I've learned how to be more patient.

I'm working on my next TV Dinners at TV Lounge, Last Man Standing, The Morning After and Last Call at MIX Bricktown for movement weekend.

#### What is your favorite post event place to eat?

My favorite place to eat is El Asador Mexican Restaurant.



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#### How long have you been creating/promoting events?

I've been promoting weekly house music events in Detroit since 1991. It's truly amazing how time flies, sometimes living through what's deemed as history you never really stop to think about what you actually accomplish. I've had numerous long term residencies at iconic places including Club 246, Lola's, TV Bar, Como's and Mix Bricktown plus countless monthly and short term DJ + promotion stints at numerous venues.

# How old were you when you promoted your first event and what was it? How did it go?

I was in my early twenties when I actually started promoting profitable events. A group of us took over promotion for the legendary Club "Cheeks" on 8 Mile Road. It was weekly set on Wednesday Nights in the late 80s. I remember bringing in Candy J, a house music singer to perform her hit "Somethings They Never Change", it was smashing success.

#### Why do you do it? What motivates you?

I do it for a living. In 1998 I realized how valuable my promo techniques were to numerous venues and gave up my corporate job to pursue a full-time career promoting and playing music. My motivation is triggered by constant a need to be creative. I love to casually think of an event theme - plan it out - and make it come to fruition. There's absolutely nothing like it ...

## Do you think people understand the risk involved in event creation/promotion?

Hell no. Everyone has a freaking opinion but unless you're actually in this business the average Joe could never understand the effort that's needed to put together a string of successful events. I watch individuals attempt to put on shows with minimal success all the time. One of my main mottos is "if it was easy everybody would be doing it - successfully"

## What is the most important lesson you learned from choosing this path and how has it helped you in your everyday life?

That's easy - happiness, period. Everyone would kill to be able to do what you love and make a living. I'm my own boss that's the best everyday life I could ever imagine.

#### What projects are you working on now?

Constantly working on things is what drives me. I'm debuting my own 2 day boutique music fest this year with a couple of close buds plus I'm heading up a 12 hour block party on multiple streets. I've moved forward on bringing in some huge global celebrity artists to also come drop some tracks with me at a specialized quarterly event. I've been feverishly working on increasing the amount of projects for Detroiters that reside in Atlanta. You can top that off with my new Residency at Central Ktichen + Bar and The Annual House Music White Party.

Bert's in Eastern Market, undoubtedly the best place to catch me chowing down after a show ...




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#### How long have you been creating/promoting events?

I started promoting events in the early 90s with my friend Marke Bieshcke under the name VOOM. Our group eventually expanded to included a fairly large family of friends.

## How old were you when you promoted your first event and what was it? How did it go?

I was 24 when I started. Our first event was called KLONK at 1515 Broadway in downtown Detroit. We filled the whole club three feet high with packing peanuts. It was amazing and changed the course of my life.

#### Why do you do it? What motivates you?

For me, promoting is an art form. It's no different than being a photographer, painter, or designer. My main motivation is and always has been to create a cultural environment that can bring a diverse community of people together to celebrate, inspire each other, and escape from the challenges of life.

# Do you think people understand the risk involved in event creation/promotion?

The people that come to our events share in the risk. I would imagine that for some it is part of the excitement of going to an underground party.

# What is the most important lesson you learned from choosing this path and how has it helped you in your everyday life?

There are so many, but if I had to choose one, it would be that music is the greatest equalizer in our community. The dance floor is a truly unique, beautiful place unlike any other. We are all equals, lost in the rhythm.

#### What projects are you working on now?

I'm working on opening my first club, BLDG01, with a group of amazingly talented, like minded friends. Until the building is ready we are creating some off-site events under the name BLDG01 that represent the type of parties we want to produce in the club when it opens.

It's time for our city and those in charge to recognize the benefits of an afterhours scene and help find a way to support those who want to create safe, alternative spaces. Creativity flourishes around the clock, in unexpected locations, among disparate groups of people who come together to form truly unique communities. I want to join with other like minded promoters and venues to make this possible .

Detroit is often compared to Berlin. Our industrial aesthetic, expansive urban ruins, and electronic music scene are amongst the reasons why. We could learn a few things from the way culture has been allowed to thrive there, and elsewhere. They have all night clubs such as Tresor and Berghain that are considered among the best in the world. There is no equivalent in Detroit, a city considered the birthplace of techno, and there never will be in this restrictive environment.

This is a shame.

#### What is your favorite post event place to eat?

Since most of our events end early in the morning, we usually end up at the nearest coney island.




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
